The investigation findings were that the involved officer had violated (sustained) numerous departmental code of conduct violations. These include Standard of Conduct, Obedience to laws (x3), Obedience to orders, recording/reporting of collisions, operation of departmental vehicles, security related to the use of computer systems, compromising criminal cases, and truthfulness. Additionally, a warrant was obtained and executed for 21 Del Code for use of cell phone, leaving the scene of a property damage accident, and failing to provide information at a collision scene.

On June 27, 2024, significant unreported damage was discovered on the passenger side of a departmental vehicle, indicating a recent motor vehicle accident. The investigation was assigned to the night shift supervisor, who was responsible for the period when the vehicle was last used.

The supervisor obtained video recordings from the vehicle's Coban system and initially questioned Dellerba, the last known user of the vehicle. Dellerba denied involvement in any accident during his night shift on June 26, 2024, claiming he had only accessed the trunk to store his gear and had not observed the vehicle's passenger side.

Upon reviewing the video footage, the supervisor observed the following sequence of events on June 26, 2024:

- 1. After securing a city gate, Dellerba was driving on Washington Street, Dover.
- 2. The vehicle veered to the right multiple times before colliding with a legally parked, unattended vehicle.
- 3. Dellerba failed to report the collision to any supervisors.
- 4. He continued his shift and parked the vehicle at the end of his tour without reporting the incident.
- 5. Dellerba was seen checking the damaged passenger side of the vehicle several times.
- 6. He used CJIS (Criminal Justice Information System) to run information on the struck vehicle, potentially interfering with the future investigation, taking substantial steps to ensure that he would be the investigating officer of the related accident.

Body-worn camera (BWC) footage revealed additional details:

- 1. Dellerba was actively using his cell phone before and during the accident.
- 2. After the collision, he placed his BWC into sleep mode, likely to prevent buffer recording.
- 3. He briefly left the scene before returning to check the damage.

Furthermore, evidence was obtained from external video at a local establishment, showing Dellerba examining the damaged vehicle and taking pictures with his cell phone during his shift. The investigation concluded that Dellerba's initial statement to his supervisor denying involvement in the accident was untruthful, based on the comprehensive video evidence collected. Additionally he failed to remain on scene or report the motor vehicle accident that he was responsible for because of the use of his cell phone while the operating a departmental vehicle.
