Victims were a forgotten part of the puzzle - seen as witnesses rather than someone affected by the crime


Rights of Special Victims

Victim Services

Victim Services Professional

Crimes defined by category

Individuals w/cognitive disability

Representative of the Victim

Victim Services

Crisis Intervention services, including crisis hotline

Emergency assistance: food, shelter, housing, clothing, financial, legal

Orientation to CJ system & court proceedings; legal rights & protections, CJ process

Trauma -informed counseling

Legal advocacy & assistance

Assistance understanding & completing civil court documents

Assistance with VCAP application

Assistance with safety planning

Support during any meeting, process, or proceeding necessary

Victim Advocates




Right to have a victim advocate present at:

- medical exam
- police reporting & interview
- trial prep
- court appearances, hearing for a PFA or SVPO, trial, or sentencing
- hearing of Board of Parole or Board of Pardons

Police & the VBR

Maintain victim/witness confidentiality



Victims to receive victim copy of report and notice of victim services



Police & the VBR



Police agencies will have a VBR compliance position




Provide notice of rights of victim & how to file a non-compliance to the VBR

Victims may review portions of body worn camera, including victim statements

Rights re: DNA/Biological Evidence

To be informed of:

- location of samples/kit
- status of DNA testing
- if DNA profile is entered into state or national DNA Index Systems
- if there is a DNA match
- of intent to destroy it





Immigrant Victims

Cannot be detained for immigration violation (civil matter)

Cannot be turned over to federal agency without a warrant

Witnesses cannot be detained for immigration violation absent a warrant





Prosecution & the VBR

Confidentiality

Expeditious disposition of criminal case

Confer with the Prosecution

Right to make a Victim Impact Statement

(Codifies many existing practices.)



Prosecution & the VBR

Right to Information & Notification:

- date/time/place of proceedings
- notice of victims' rights
- what to do if threatened or harassed
- charging decisions
- if DOJ chooses not to pursue charges
 & the legal basis for the decision
- specifics of sentencing orders
- any appeal or hearings
- decisions from any appeal or hearings





Courts & the VBR

Speedy trial



- Info regarding time/place/date of proceedings
- Right to make a victim impact statement
- Notification about applications for parole or pardon, including time/date/place of any hearing with the Board of Parole or Board of Pardons

Courts & the VBR



Safety:

- Separate waiting area for victims and witnesses;
 if unavailable, then other safeguards
- Victims may express safety concerns to the court and request reasonable measures to ensure their safety

Dept. of Correction & the VBR



Victim may request:

- terms of probation
- terms of parole
- defendant's compliance/non -compliance
 with sentence, probation, or parole

Dept. of Correction & the VBR



Victim will receive notification of:

- Defendant's release date
- Release to a community based program
- Offender escape
- Hearing date with Board of Parole or Board of Pardons

Youth Rehabilitation Services & the VBR

Victim may request:

- terms of probation
- defendant's
 compliance/non
 compliance with
 sentence, probation,
 or parole

Victim will receive notification of:

- Defendant's release date
- Release to a community based program
- Offender escape

Complaints





Victim
Someone acting on their behalf

Enforcement

DOJ enforces compliance

Police, DOJ, DOC must designate supervisor to receive complaints, provide written summary of investigation, if found in compliance how to appeal

Remedies

No claim for damages may be made against gov't employees or agencies

Victims may request a court order to make agency comply

Limitations

Non -compliance does not cancel plea deals or case outcomes

Defendants have no standing to object based on victims' rights obligations





Weave Rights Education Into Every Contact

Have handouts and information

Partner With System -Based Advocates

Empowering without Giving Advice



- ·Use 'can,' 'may,' or 'have the right to' instead of 'should' or 'must.'
- •Reinforce choice and control every victim's situation is unique.
- •Always pair information with a referral to the appropriate source.

Advocates provide general information and connect victims with qualified legal professionals for specific guidance.
